

A Delegation from Urbana Traveled to Thionville in November 2014












Urbana traveled to Thionville, France in 2014 to help celebrate the 70th anniversary of the city's liberation from Axis occupation. A Sister Cities/Twinning City charter was signed by Mayors Laurel Prussing and Anne Grommerch. Urbana WW II Veteran Kermit Harden joined our delegation and addressed the assembly.

Urbana received an invitation from the City of Thionville to come to France to participate in the 75th anniversary celebration of the of the liberation of their city from German occupation at the end of World War II, with the arrival of the American 3rd Army under General George S. Patton.

Touring the City Hall, we are shown the "URBANA ROOM." The Twinning Cities Charter signed in 2014 and books about Urbana are displayed on the sideboard just outside the Mayor's office.





We tour downtown Thionville, starting with the city building. The façade was decorated with the flags of France and the U.S.A. The window art transforms the building into a giant Advent calendar.









We visit the city's Clock Tower, the Tour aux Puces Museum, and St. Maximin Church.



The City of Thionville has dedicated a plaza named after the late Mayor Anne Grommerch.



The Allée Raymond Poincaré has a bike path down the center median, lined with trees.

Cars may park in the median between the trees.

Saturday morning we attended a ceremonial review of the French military army and air force.

Wreath Laying Ceremony - Malling, France







We then drove to Malling, a town 20 km up the Moselle River, to participate in a wreath laying ceremony in the village square, at a monument to those who perished during the war.

After lunch we watched a demonstration of an American football exhibition match at Jeanne d'Arc Stadium in Thionville.



Members of the Air Force band entertained citizens at the entrance to the Council chambers in the Clock Tower with American Big Band and swing music before the Charter signing ceremony.







The Council Chamber was packed. Standing room only.





Mayor Pierre Cuny addressed the assembly, followed by the reading of a Proclamation from Urbana Mayor Diane Wolfe Marlin, delivered by Alderman Dennis Roberts.



Alderman Dennis Roberts, Mayor Pierre Cuny, and Twinning Cities event coordinator Elise Poillot signed the renewed Charter documents.



Four copies of the Charter, in French and English, were signed.





The newly signed Twinning Cities / Sister Cities Charter.




A children's choir sang the United States national anthem, *The Star Spangled Banner*, followed by the French national anthem, *La Marseillaise*.

Thionville Honoring Urbana Veteran Kermit L. Harden





Maire Cuny announced in his speech during this ceremony that the city of Thionville will name a street in the new redevelopment project planned for the east bank of the Moselle River after Urbana's American WW II veteran, Mr. Kermit L. Harden Jr.

Kermit landed on Omaha Beach in August of 1944, and fought under General George S. Patton and the Third American Army.

Kermit was was captured at St. Lo and held prisoner for several months. He was one of the few American POW's that were exchanged during the war. After a short hospitalization Kermit was redeployed and fought in the Battle of the Bulge. He suffered frostbite on his legs and feet and was hospitalized at Metz, France, 29 km south of Thionville.

Kermit Harden was honored by French President Sarcozy with the Legion of Honor award for his role in liberating France. Mr. Harden passed away at age 94 on June 19, 2019.

An evening Gala dinner and party was held at Château de La Grange in Manom, France, just a few kilometers outside of Thionville. We were greeted by Music on the stairwell.




A large crowd attended the Gala. The chateau was a beautiful setting for the event.


