# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



### Improved Implementation of CIP

	FY23	FY24	NET CHANGE	NOTES
Overall Revised Budget, Mid-FY	\$ 30.6M	\$ 43.3M	+42%	Fire Stations 2 & 3 Construction primary contributor to increase from 2023.
Actual Spent or Encumbered by Mid-FY	\$ 9.7M	\$ 10.6M	+9%	Up almost 10% from this same time last year.
Estimated Spent or Encumbered by end of FY	\$ 18.8M	\$ 38.7M	+106%	Exceptional effort by our staff to maximize project initiation & completion this year; Engineering Division, Special Projects Manager, and Facilities Section specifically.
Estimated Move to Next FY	\$ 11.8M	\$ 4.6M	-61%	This is a good thing; we are getting more done and deferring or delaying less projects.
Percentage of Spending on Schedule by end of FY	61%	89%	+45%	90% of spending is reasonably on schedule. Major win and critical to slowing the decline of our public infrastructure.



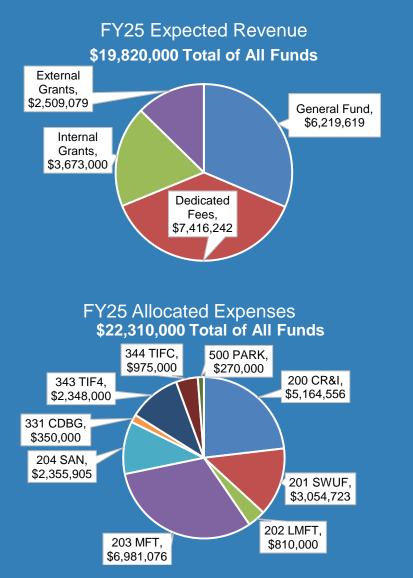
#### **Presentation of Unattained Grants**

  - N. Lincoln Ave. (Wascher to Killarney), if no SS4A grant for construction.
  - S. Lincoln Ave. (Florida to Green), if N. Lincoln Ave. uses CUUATS federal funding.
- Continue to pursue grant funding for these large transportation projects.

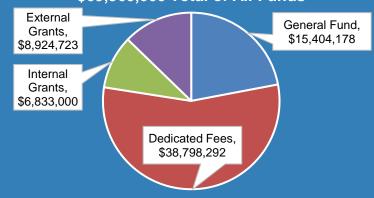

External Grants = grant funding from sources outside of the City.



#### Mayor/Council Goals 2024-2025 Strategic Area #3: Infrastructure

Strategy 1. Improve quality of current infrastructure assets

- Action Step A: Complete sanitary sewer asset management plan and roadway asset management plan by the end of fiscal year 2025.
- Action Step B: Review and adjust dedicated revenue streams for infrastructure assets, beginning with the Local Motor Fuel Tax

Strategy 2. Increase investment in infrastructure equity

• Action Step A: Complete 10 Equity and Quality of Life (EQL) projects by end of calendar year 2024 and initiate a second EQL round by end of calendar year 2025.

Strategy 3. Expand green infrastructure within the community

• Action Step A: Evaluate the practical and financial feasibility of sustainability improvements in City facility capital projects.



#### Mayor/Council Goals 2024-2025 Strategic Area #4: Economic Health

**Strategy 1. Support local businesses** 

• Action Step C: Issue at least two Request for Proposals for development of Downtown Cityowned sites for housing developments.



### Stormwater Utility Rate Increase

- Stormwater utility fee increase over five years:
  - \$8.00 \$10.60 / ERU / month
- \$3.8M additional revenue for FY25-FY29.
- Additional revenue allocations:
  - \$2.7M for sewer clean and televise.
  - \$0.6M for misc. storm sewer repairs.
- By end of FY29, will have data needed to better define short and long-term capital needs









### **Proposed Local MFT Increase**

The CIP reflects a tentative market rate adjustment from \$0.05 to \$0.10 per gallon on Jan. 1, 2025, which would add \$3.2 million in LMFT revenue from FY25-FY29.

If implemented, additional LMFT funds would fund: (1) Increase Bituminous Surface Treatment program budget; (2) Move transportation O&M from CR&I fund to LMFT fund; and (3) New Asphalt Overlay and Resurfacing program starting FY28.











#### Bonding and Fund Transfer for Facilities

Funding to Replace Fire Stations #2 and #3:

- \$2.5M DCEO grants (FY24)
- \$10M bonding (FY25)
- \$2M one-time transfer from General Fund to CR&I (FY25)

Funding for Public Works Campus Renovation:

 \$0.8M one-time transfer from General Fund to CR&I (FY25)

\$1.2M annual debt payments, starting FY26.





#### Windsor Rd. Maintenance Program

City awarded \$2.9M in settlement of Windsor Road Trial.Settlement revenue for extra maintenance and rehab.

Recommended maintenance and rehab plan through FY55:

- Pavement patching in FY22.
- Joint and crack sealing in FY24.



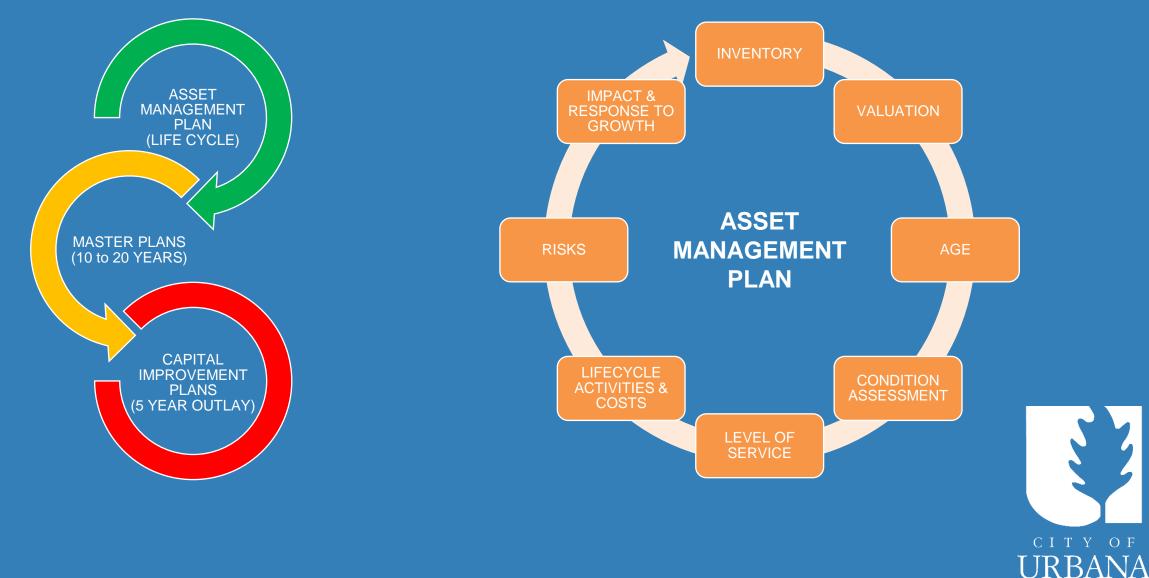


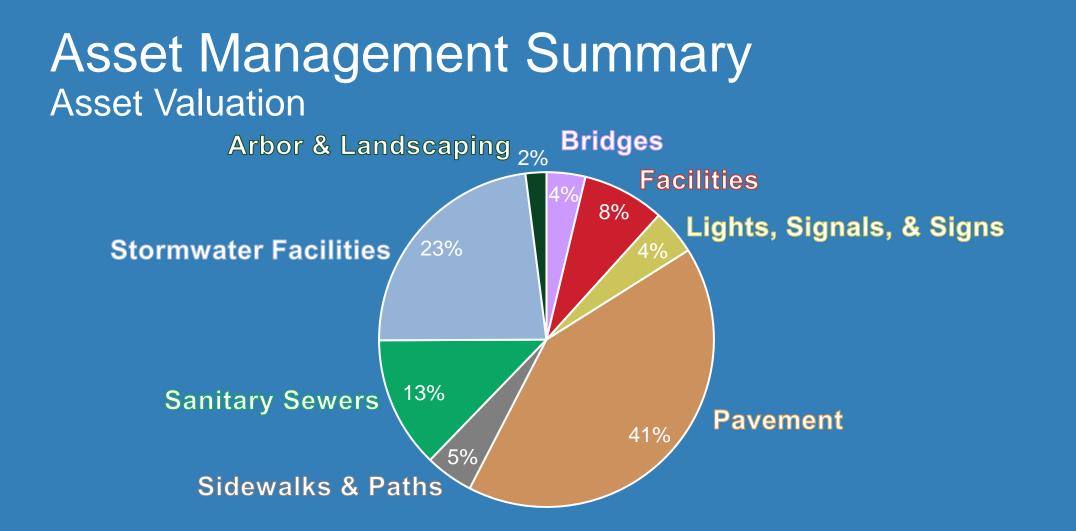

### **Asset Management Summary**



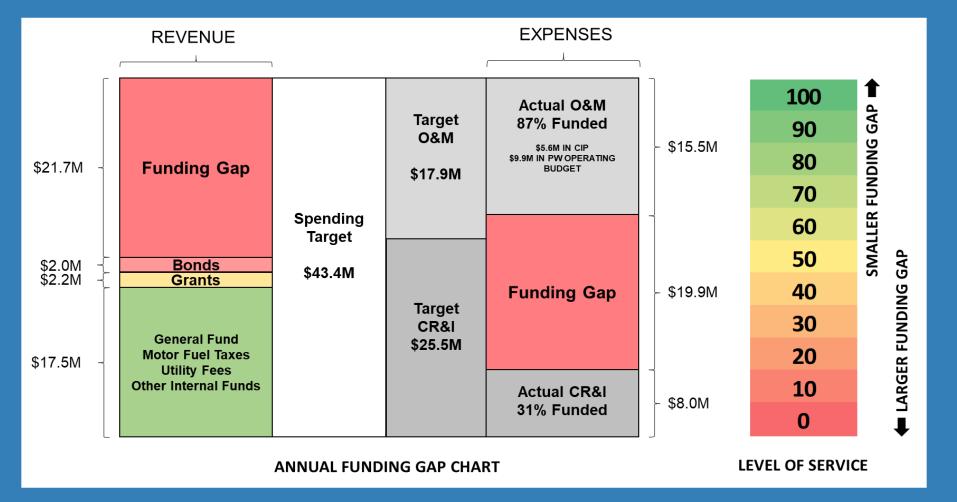


2024 CIP Estimated Asset Valuation = \$1,787,000,000 (Yes, that is BILLION, with a B)

Asset valuation is based on estimated Current Reconstruction Value (CRV). CRV estimates for assets were calculated using rough metrics that rely heavily on assumptions but these estimates are reflective of the best available information for each asset.

Note: Funding gap in revenue slightly exceeds expenses because we are spending down existing fund balances.



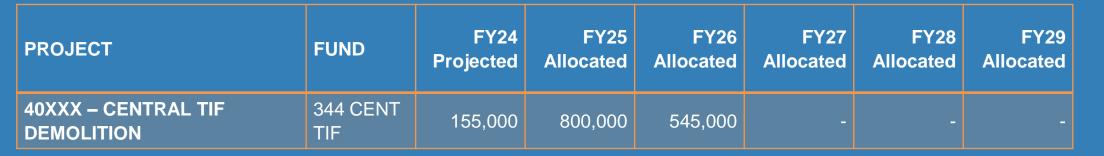

  - Timeline to be determined.

- Pavement rehabilitation with potential road diet and pedestrian improvements.
- Added budget from Central TIF to fund Public Realm Study recommendations.
- Studies & Plans FY25, Construction FY26.

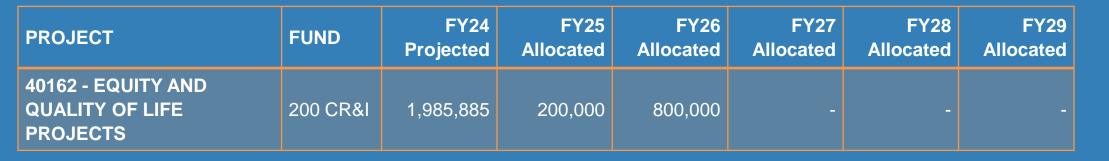

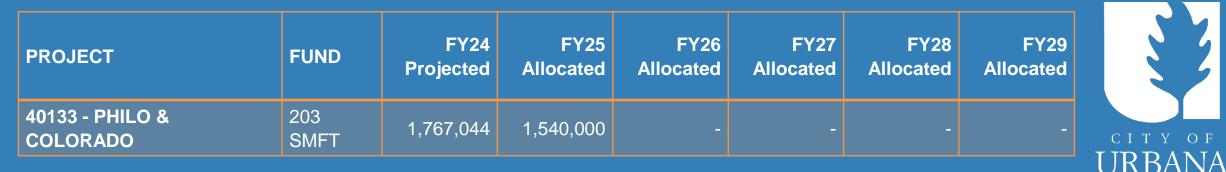

## Ongoing Projects – Cunningham TIF

- Traffic Studies: reduced scope to the Cunningham-Kenyon intersection.
- Pavement Patching: reduced from three years to one year.
- Country Club & Perkins: increased budget with updated construction costs and expanded scope of drainage design.

- Study FY23-FY24, Plans & Construction FY25.

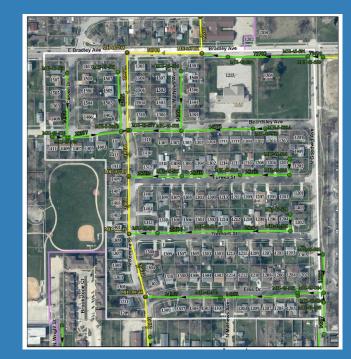

#### Ongoing Projects – ARPA Lateral Lining Pilot

- Rehabilitation of private sanitary sewer laterals with lining can be a reliable, cost effective, and proactive alternative to reconstruction.
- Reduces risk of costly repairs borne by property owner, and improves efficiency of sanitary sewer network by reducing infiltration.
- Pilot program in Dr. Ellis Subdivision.
- Construction started one fiscal year earlier.



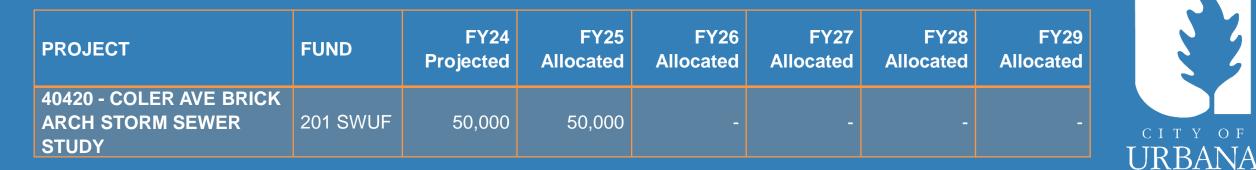

- Increased budget for Study in FY25.

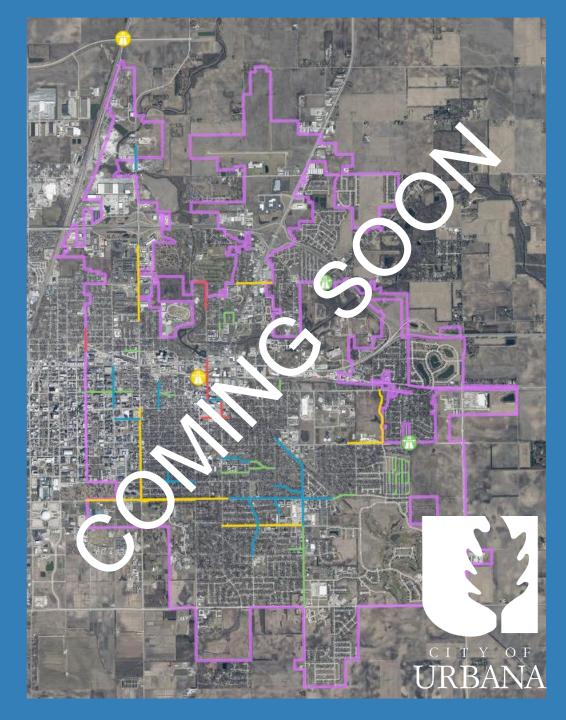
