Final Report of Midwest Mandeng – Urbana Festivals 2016 CU West African Drum and Dance Collective Jamie McGowan, Mara Thacker, Susan Ogwal

Thanks to the City of Urbana Public Arts Grant, Midwest Mandeng – an African Drum and Dance Festival is not only possible but a great and growing success in this community! In 2016, our organization advanced the festival further with seven first-class artists, more supporting partners, and a wide and enthusiastic attendance from across the region and locally. In short, we were absolutely thrilled with the event. What's more, attendees report their great respect and enthusiasm for the event, too. (See attached evaluation—submitted confidentially from participants.)

Held from Oct. 7-9, 2016, the festival was held largely at the Krannert Center for the Performing Arts but additional free performances were held at The Urbana Free Library and the University Library, and we held our evening drum and dance party at Pizza M in downtown Urbana.

Our partnership with the Krannert Center was essential, as our options for a suitable venue were limited both by budgetary realities and the closing of Urbana's downtown hotel. Fortunately for us, Krannert offers superb space, support, and credibility for our festival, and as a result we greatly benefited from this fortunate partnership. Our attendance increased substantially this year, particularly attracting many more local attendees, we think due in part to our location and affiliation with Krannert, but also thanks to greater media coverage. This year over 275 people attended our workshops, demonstrations, and party.

We had strong attendance again from across the Midwestern region, including: Missouri (St. Louis, Columbia), Illinois (Chicago, East St. Louis, Champaign, Urbana, Mahomet, Savoy, Richton Park, Granite City), Wisconsin (Madison, Kenosha, Milwaukee, and Oshkosh), Indiana (Indianapolis, South Bend, and Bloomington), Kentucky (Louisville), and Michigan (Detroit, Lansing, Ann Arbor), and Virginia (Virginia Beach)! While we do not collect demographic information on our attendees, the diversity of the event is very notable, and we make every effort to support an inclusive, accessible event. We do this by making all events free to children under 13 and seniors over 65. We had numerous people take advantage of this access, as well. Additionally, we offer opportunities for attendees to earn free access to all events by volunteering at our events. Students and lower-income people reach out to us on this possibility, and we always have offered opportunities and free access to them on that basis. Lastly, we offer volume discounts to groups registering with multiple people.


Due to higher expenses for travel and housing and the reduced funding received, we reduced costs this year by eliminating some of our print advertising and made an even more concerted effort to bring in advertising partnerships. For advertising, we concentrated on our electronic media (Facebook, email, listservs, our website), media outreach (*The News-Gazette*), liaising with strategic organizations (the Urbana Business Association, The Urbana Free Library, Krannert Center, Krannert Art, the Folk and Roots Festival, U of Illinois' School of Music, the Department of Dance, Center for African Studies, Center for Global Studies, Center for World Music, and the University Library). As noted, we also reached out to local businesses again, offering advertising options to them. These businesses include: H20 Salon and Spa, Manolo's Pizza and Empanadas, Maize, Weiskamp Screen Printing, and The Common Ground Food Coop. We also had two private donors, one of which was a provision of a frequent flyer airlines ticket.

We learned important lessons again this year, and we intend to revisit these lessons in planning for our next festival. We would like to work with very closely with Krannert Center in planning the next event and the Department of Dance. Both are critical and crucial in our success, and both have had very positive input on the unfolding of the event. We believe we have created strong and solid good will between our group and these entities, but we suspect they will continue be helpful in future events. We need to develop our board further. With individuals moving away and changes in the board, we would like to create great involvement and

investment of time with our board, through better board management and outreach. This takes both time and some commitment of money, which is in short supply for any fledgling group, but we are optimistic about the investment. Lastly, we aim to create a 501(c)3 organization, so that we can be involved in other fundraising efforts over time. This goal also takes money, expertise, and time to execute, but the long-term pay off will be worth the investment.



I had some discussion with drummer friends about a couple things that I'd like to share. First idea: Have one featured drum artist and one dance artist for the whole workshop, on a rotating basis (i.e. Moussa & Dieneba one year, Bolokada & Youssouf the next, other pair the next). This would allow the experience to be more immersive and artistically focused over the three days. Of course, it means more work for the artists during the conference, less work for the artists not there that year, and attendance might vary by year. But, some way of making the whole experience more intensive would be great. Second, for drummers: it would be great to have the option of choosing a more advanced set of classes, and one more geared towards beginning players. Maybe a beginning track and an "intermediate/advanced", or something like that. We definitely understand the desire for a welcoming, inclusive atmosphere, but it would be great for more experienced players to be able to get a more challenging, focused learning experience from the great artists at the conference. Perhaps intermediate/advanced track would cost a bit more and include all classes? One way to do it would be to still have all three artists present, one teacher teaches all the classes in one day, one (or two) beginning or all levels, and one advanced. Fode teaches two on Friday, Bolo teaches 3 on Sat. and Moussa 2 on Sunday, along with Abass's class. Clearly it would take some thinking and planning, from the organizers and the artists, but I think folks might really benefit from having the class experiences be tailored a little more closely to their experience/skill level.

MIDWEST MANDENG Dance, drum festival this weekend

URBANA — The third annual Midwest Mandeng, an African dance and drum festival, will take place Friday through Sunday in Urbana.

The festival will feature workshops taught by masters of Guinean and Malian drumming, as well as presentations and demonstrations.

The C-U West African Drum & Dance Collective organizes the festival, which is supported by an Urbana Public Arts grant and various businesses and organizations.

"We've had people come from near and far every year — Canadians, Californians and folks from across the Midwest," said Jamie McGowan, one of the organizers.

Midwest Mandeng classes begin at

12:30 p.m. Friday at Krannert Center for the Performing Arts with Malian dance taught by **Djeneba Sako** and Guinean djembe drumming led by **Fode Bangoura** at 2:15 p.m.

The classes and other events continue Saturday and Sunday, with a Dundunba Party from 9 to 11 p.m. Saturday at Pizza M, 208 W. Main St., U.
