

Aspen Court Apartments



Apartments' receiver withdraws appeal of condemnation in Urbana

URBANA — City officials are considering their next move after the receiver for the troubled Urbana Townhomes apartment complex in the 900 and 1000 blocks of South Lierman Avenue withdrew its appeal of the city's condemnation.

Officials first started condemning the group of eight buildings in March 2011, when the first two at 1001 and 1003 S. Lierman Ave. were started on a process that could end in demolition. Officials condemned another apartment building at 911 S. Lierman Ave. in March 2012. Five more, 901-909 S. Lierman Ave., were condemned this July.

As of Wednesday, there were 152 property maintenance code violations that needed to be addressed, said building safety manager John Schneider. Those



Home Run Food Mart Owners Surrender Liquor License

Representatives of the Home Run Food Mart in east Urbana voluntarily surrendered the convenience store's Class C liquor license Wednesday (June 20) at a local liquor control commission hearing.

Mayor Laurel Prussing agreed to accept the surrender of the liquor license during the 11 a.m. hearing in city council chambers. She ordered that all liquor sales must cease immediately.

The order means that the owner of the store, Diah Corp., can no longer sell package beer, wine and liquor. The store, however, remains open for business.

Ramzi Alsaqri, president of Diah Corp., and Jameel Alsaqri, corporation secretary, attended the brief hearing and were represented by Champaign attorney Ed Piraino. No public testimony was taken. About 40 people, including some supporters of the store, attended the hearing.

Ramzi Alsaqri was arrested about 8 a.m. June 7, along with store employee Mohammed Mahmoud, at the store. Both were charged with the unlawful sale of drug paraphernalia, a Class 4 felony. Jameel Alsaqri was later arrested on the same charge.

East Urbana melee connected to gangs, UHS fight

URBANA — Urbana police are continuing to sort out who was involved in a riot in an east Urbana neighborhood Tuesday night that left one teen hospitalized and at least three adult women injured.

Sgt. Dan Morgan said the confrontation was a continuation of an ongoing feud between gangs in that area of town that included an incident over the weekend where shots were fired and a fight at Urbana High School on Monday.

"Two feuding groups of juveniles encounter one another in front of 1102 Austin Drive, where there have been previous confrontations, including one Friday or Saturday where there was a gang fight in the street where shots were fired," Morgan said.


About 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, one of the members of one faction was walking past that house when a person came out, words were exchanged, and a fight started.

"The fight grows to 30 or more people," said Morgan. "Some members of one of the faction's family drive up in a car. Two women, a guy and kid get out to intervene and they're attacked by the various factions and the car is destroyed by people beating it with two-by-fours and chairs."

Morgan said at some point during the chaos, the 16-year-old boy who walked by the house, which apparently sparked the melee, was stabbed in the upper back shoulder. He was taken to Carle Foundation Hospital where he spent the night, Morgan said.




Broken fences show desired paths / Source: Q.C.D. Tse

Urbana to Host Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for Lanore Adams Fairlawn Multi-Use Path

The City of Urbana, in partnership with the Urbana Business Association, will host a ribbon cutting event for the Lanore Adams Fairlawn Multi-Use Path. The celebration will take place on Saturday, September 14, 2013 at 3 p.m. at the intersections of Fairlawn Drive and Adams Street in Urbana.

City of Urbana Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds were used to construct the recently completed 8-foot wide concrete multi-use path which connects Lanore Drive to Fairlawn and Adams Streets. The pathway can be used by both pedestrians and bicyclist. As part of the pathway's construction, the area also received new solar powered LED light fixtures, as well as enhanced landscaping through the planting of five Burr Oak trees, three Winter King Hawthorn trees, Juniper bushes, and a low-grow prairie plant mixture.

The project was administered by the Community Development Services Department – Grants Management Division, and completed by the Urbana Public Works Department.



SPLASH Program Receipient of City of Urbana Grant

Urbana – The City of Urbana, <u>Urbana Park District</u> and <u>Urbana School District #116</u> are pleased to announce the awarding of a program grant for USD #116 and the Park District's SPLASH (Students Playing and Learning Afterschool Hours) before and after school program. The grant will help fund this vital program for the 2013-2014 fiscal year.

SPLASH is a before and after school program at the Urbana Middle School (UMS). SPLASH activities are led by UMS staff, Urbana Park District staff and community partners.
